NWF at Work - Promoting Native Plants

Through its Garden for Wildlife tm program, the National Wildlife Federation has long urged homeowners and others to cultivate plants native to their region. Not only are nonnative landscaping species risky-with the potential to escape and cause harm to ecosystems-they do not provide the food that local wildlife need.

Recently, the Federation launched a new tool for computers, tablets and smartphones that helps gardeners pick by zip code the best native plants for wildlife in their specific area. See <u>www.nwf.org/nativeplantfinder</u>.
