\*Brewster Carmel: The Blue Star committee of the Brewster/ Carmel Garden Club has been busy preparing for their Blue Star ceremony on October 13th. Invitations have been printed and will soon be sent. The stone is being donated and as well the plaque as mentioned in the last Grapevine. We are participating in the Brewster Fall Festival in September. Members have prepared planters with succulents which will be sold at the event as well as plants from their gardens and flower arrangements. We had two outstanding presentations in June and July. An educator from Wave Hill presented on planting and maintaining lavender in your garden and P.C. Carey from the Connecticut Bee Keeping Association did a very informative presentation on bee hives and the habits of the bee population. In June, 16 of our members toured Holister House and Gardens in Connecticut. We are happy to report that we have inducted 5 new members since February 2018. Each is already actively involved in our activities.
