Currently, we are preparing for our joint meeting with the Lake Mahopac Garden Club in November and holiday decorating in December.

*Lake Mahopac: October – The program for our our monthly meeting was "Bonkers about Begonias" presented by an enthusiastic begonia lady, Chris Ferraro, Master Gardener. On the 20th we held our major fund raiser of the year, "Tea at Sleepy Hollow." Attendees were encouraged to dress in Halloween costume. We will be bringing grab bag gifts for members, but also Christmas gifts for Children in Need through Putnam County Children's Committee.


